Sub.: Bimarla Bauxite Mine of M/s Minerals & Mineral Limited located in village Barang, Ghaghra, Korle and Bimarla, District Gumla, Jharkhand - Environmental Clearance regarding.

This has reference to your letter no. M&M/LHD/AVP(M)/MoEF/872 dated 20.01.2012 and further letter dated 24.06.2013 on the subject mentioned above. The project was earlier prescribed Terms of Reference (TORs) by the Ministry of Environment and Forests on 08/06/2009 for undertaking detailed EIA study for the purpose of obtaining environmental clearance. The proposal was considered in 28th Meeting of the Expert Appraisal Committee held during June 20th-22nd, 2012 wherein the proposal was recommended for environmental clearance.

- 2. The proposal is for production of 0.3 million TPA of bauxite and the mine is located in village Barang, Ghaghra, Korle and Bimarla, District Gumla, Jharkhand. The total mine lease area of the project is 134.526 ha. No forest land is involved and 129.678 ha is agricultural land and 4.848 ha is government waste land.
- 3. The mine working will be opencast by semi-mechanized method involving drilling and blasting. The Mining Plan along with PMCP was approved by the Indian Bureau of Mines, Bhubaneswar and Jharkhand on 19-11-2008 over an area of 134.526 ha. Life of the mine is 16 years.
- 4. The topography of the area is a plateau slopping gradually in all direction and reported to lies between 23° 16' 28" N & 23° 18' 10" N Latitude and 84° 24' 50" E & 84° 25' 51" E Longitude. The ultimate working depth will be 12 m below ground level which varies between 1034 to 1064 m AMSL. Ground water table is reported to be less than 970 m AMSL. Mine working will not intersect groundwater table. The peak water requirement for the project is estimated as $34m^{3}$ /day which will be sourced from ground water.

- 5. No National park/Wildlife sanctuary/Biosphere reserve/Tiger reserve/Elephant reserve, etc. are reported to be located in the core and buffer zone of within 10 km of the periphery of the project site and that the area does not report to form corridor for Schedule-I fauna. A number of seasonal nalas flow at a distance of 3 to 5 KM from the mining lease boundary.
- 6. It is estimated that 1.87 million m^3 of overburden/waste will be generated during mine life and there will be one external dump having maximum projected height of 10 m with overall slope of 28° . At the end of the life of the mine, no waste will be left at the earmarked dump area. The plantation is proposed over an area of 24 ha with 2500 samplings per ha.
- 7. The public hearing of the project was held on 27.07.2011 and the action plan to address the issues raised during public hearing was presented and discussed, which inter-alia included compensation for land, peripheral development including drinking water facility, education, maintenance of village road, medical facility, provision of transport and ambulance, protection of agriculture field from the impact of mining, etc. The capital cost of the project is 520 lakhs and budget for environmental protection measures is Rs. 45 Lakhs towards capital investment and Rs. 27.5 Lakhs towards recurring expense/annum.
- 8. The Ministry of Environment and Forests has examined the application in accordance with the EIA Notification, 2006 and hereby accords environmental clearance under the provisions thereof to the above mentioned Simaria Bauxite Mine of M/s Minerals & Mineral Limited located in village Barang, Ghaghra, Korle and Bimarla, District Gumla, Jharkhand for an annual production capacity of 0.3 million tonnes of bauxite by the opencast manual method involving total mine lease area of 134.526ha subject to implementation of the following conditions and environmental safeguards.

A. Specific conditions:

- (i) The project proponent shall obtain Consent to Establish and Consent to Operate from the Jharkhand State Pollution Control Board and effectively implement all the conditions stipulated therein.
- (ii) Implementation of conditions laid down in the letter of the State Department of Forests vide dated 11.05.2012 with regard to permission for transportation of ore through the forest land.
- (iii) Necessary wildlife clearance as may be applicable to this project should be obtained. Measures for conservation of flora and fauna observed in the study area shall be undertaken. Wildlife Conservation Plan shall be implemented in consultation with the State Forests and Wildlife Department.
- (iv) Adequate measures for control of air pollution in the area shall be taken and it shall be ensured that the pollution levels do not exceed the prescribed limits.

- (v) No working shall be undertaken in the forest area for which forestry clearance has not been obtained.
- (vi) Necessary prior clearance, as applicable shall be obtained from CGWA for working below groundwater table.
- (vii) The Company shall submit within 3 months their policy towards Corporate Environment Responsibility which should inter-alia provide for (i) Standard operating process / process to bring into focus any infringement / deviation / violation of the environmental or forest norms / conditions, (ii) Hierarchical system or Administrative order of the company to deal with the environmental issues and for ensuring compliance with the EC conditions and (iii) System of reporting of non-compliances / violations of environmental norms to the Board of Directors of the company and / or shareholders or stakeholders.
- (viii) The mining operations shall be restricted to above the groundwater table and it should not intersect the groundwater table. In case of working below the groundwater table, prior approval of the Ministry of Environment and Forests and the Central Ground Water Authority shall be obtained, for which a detailed hydrogeological study shall be carried out.
- (ix) The project proponent shall ensure that no natural watercourse and/or water resources shall be obstructed due to any mining operations. The first order streams and the seasonal nallahs originating from the mining lease area shall be protected.
- (x) The top soil, if any shall temporarily be stored at earmarked site(s) only and it should not be kept unutilized for long. The topsoil shall be used for land reclamation and plantation.
- (xi) Monitoring and management of rehabilitated areas should continue until the vegetation becomes self-sustaining. Compliance status should be submitted to the Ministry of Environment & Forests and its Regional Office, Bhubaneswar on six monthly basis.
- (xii) Catch drains and siltation ponds of appropriate size shall be constructed around the working pit, sub-grade dump, soil and mineral dumps to arrest flow of silt and sediment directly into the agricultural fields and the water bodies. The water so collected should be utilized for watering the mine area, roads, green belt development etc. The drains should be regularly desilted, particularly after monsoon, and maintained properly.

Garland drains settling tanks and check dams of appropriate size, gradient and length shall be constructed for both around the mine pit and sub-grade dump to prevent run off of water and flow sediments directly into the agricultural fields and the water bodies and sump capacity should be designed keeping 50% safety margin over and above peak sudden rainfall (based on 50 years data) and maximum discharge in the area adjoining the mine site. Sump capacity should also provide adequate retention period to allow proper settling

- of silt material. Sedimentation pits should be constructed at the corners of the garland drains and desilted at regular intervals.
- (xiii) Dimension of the retaining wall at the toe of sub-grade dump and OB benches within the mine to check run-off and siltation should be based on the rain fall data.
- (xiv) The plantation is proposed over an area of 24 ha with 2500 samplings per ha.
- (xv) Effective safeguard measures, such as regular water sprinkling shall be carried out in critical areas prone to air pollution and having high levels of particulate matter such as around loading and unloading point and all transfer points. Extensive water sprinkling shall be carried out on haul roads. It should be ensured that the Ambient Air Quality parameters conform to the norms prescribed by the Central Pollution Control Board in this regard.
- (xvi) The project authority should implement suitable conservation measures to augment ground water resources in the area in consultation with the Regional Director, Central Ground Water Board.
- (xvii) Regular monitoring of ground water level and quality shall be carried out in and around the mine lease by establishing a network of existing wells and installing new piezometers during the mining operation. The periodic monitoring [(at least four times in a year- pre-monsoon (April-May), monsoon (August), post-monsoon (November) and winter (January); once in each season)] shall be carried out in consultation with the State Ground Water Board/Central Ground Water Authority and the data thus collected may be sent regularly to the Ministry of Environment and Forests and its Regional Office Bhubaneswar, the Central Ground Water Authority and the Regional Director, Central Ground Water Board. If at any stage, it is observed that the groundwater table is getting depleted due to the mining activity, necessary corrective measures shall be carried out.
- (xviii) Monitoring of the springs shall be carried out for the quality and quantity of water regularly so as to ensure that there is no adverse impact on the same due to the project. Records in this regards shall be maintained.
- (xix) It shall be ensured that there is no change in the hydrology of the area due to the project.
- (xx) Suitable rainwater harvesting measures on long term basis shall be planned and implemented in consultation with the Regional Director, Central Ground Water Board.
- (xxi) Appropriate mitigative measures shall be taken to prevent pollution of the all the water bodies, in consultation with the State Pollution Control Board.
- (xxii) Vehicular emissions shall be kept under control and regularly monitored. Measures shall be taken for maintenance of vehicles used in mining operations

- and in transportation of mineral from mine face to the beneficiation plant. The vehicles shall be covered with a tarpaulin and shall not be overloaded.
- (xxiii) Blasting operation shall be carried out only during the daytime. Controlled blasting shall be practiced. The mitigative measures for control of ground vibrations and to arrest fly rocks and boulders should be implemented.
- (xxiv) Drills shall either be operated with dust extractors or equipped with water injection system.
- (xxv) Mineral handling area shall be provided with adequate number of high efficiency dust extraction system. Loading and unloading areas including all the transfer points should also have efficient dust control arrangements. These should be properly maintained and operated.
- (xxvi) Sewage treatment plant shall be installed for the colony. ETP shall also be provided for the workshop and wastewater generated during the mining operation.
- (xxvii) The project authorities should undertake sample survey to generate data on pre project community health status within a radius of 1 km from proposed mine.
- (xxviii) Pre-placement medical examination and periodical medical examination of the workers engaged in the project shall be carried out and records maintained. For the purpose, schedule of health examination of the workers should be drawn and followed accordingly.
- (xxix) Provision shall be made for the housing of construction labour within the site with all necessary infrastructure and facilities such as fuel for cooking, mobile toilets, mobile STP, safe drinking water, medical health care, crèche etc. The housing may be in the form of temporary structures to be removed after the completion of the project.
- The critical parameters such as RSPM (Particulate matter with size less than 10pm i.e. PM₁₀) and NOx in the ambient air within the impact zone, peak particle velocity at 300m distance or within the nearest habitation, whichever is closer shall be monitored periodically. Further, quality of discharged water shall also be monitored [(TDS, DO, PH and Total Suspended Solids (TSS)]. The monitored data shall be uploaded on the website of the company as well as displayed on a display board at the project site at a suitable location near the main gate of the Company in public domain. The Circular No. J-20012/1/2006-IA.II (M) dated 27.05.2009 issued by Ministry of Environment and Forests, which is available on the website of the Ministry www.envfor.nic.in shall also be referred in this regard for its compliance.
- (xxxi) A Final Mine Closure Plan along with details of Corpus Fund should be submitted to the Ministry of Environment & Forests 5 years in advance of final mine closure for approval.

B. General conditions:

- (i) No change in mining technology and scope of working should be made without prior approval of the Ministry of Environment & Forests.
- (ii) No change in the calendar plan including excavation, quantum of mineral bauxite and waste should be made.
- (iii) Conservation measures for protection of flora and fauna in the core and buffer zone should be drawn up in consultation with the local forest and wildlife department.
- (iv) At least four ambient air quality-monitoring stations should be established in the core zone as well as in the buffer zone for RSPM (Particulate matter with size less than 10 micron i.e., PM_{10}) and NOx monitoring. Location of the stations should be decided based on the meteorological data, topographical features and environmentally and ecologically sensitive targets and frequency of monitoring should be undertaken in consultation with the State Pollution Control Board.
- (v) Data on ambient air quality [(RSPM(Particulate matter with size less than 10micron i.e., PM10) and NOx] should be regularly submitted to the Ministry including its Regional office located at Bhubaneswar and the State Pollution Control Board / Central Pollution Control Board once in six months.
- (vi) Fugitive dust emissions from all the sources should be controlled regularly. Water spraying arrangement on haul roads, loading and unloading and at transfer points should be provided and properly maintained.
- (vii) Measures should be taken for control of noise levels below 85 dBA in the work environment. Workers engaged in operations of HEMM, etc. should be provided with ear plugs / muffs.
- (viii) Industrial waste water (workshop and waste water from the mine) should be properly collected, treated so as to conform to the standards prescribed under GSR 422 (E) dated 19th May, 1993 and 31st December, 1993 or as amended from time to time. Oil and grease trap should be installed before discharge of workshop effluents.
- (ix) Personnel working in dusty areas should wear protective respiratory devices and they should also be provided with adequate training and information on safety and health aspects. Occupational health surveillance program of the workers should be undertaken periodically to observe any contractions due to exposure to dust and take corrective measures, if needed.
- (x) A separate environmental management cell with suitable qualified personnel should be set-up under the control of a Senior Executive, who will report

directly to the Head of the Organization.

- (xi) The funds earmarked for environmental protection measures should be kept in separate account and should not be diverted for other purpose. Year wise expenditure should be reported to the Ministry and its Regional Office located at Bhubaneswar.
- (xii) The project authorities should inform to the Regional Office located at Bhubaneswar regarding date of financial closures and final approval of the project by the concerned authorities and the date of start of land development work.
- (xiii) The Regional Office of this Ministry located at Bhubaneswar shall monitor compliance of the stipulated conditions. The project authorities should extend full cooperation to the officer (s) of the Regional Office by furnishing the requisite data / information / monitoring reports.
- (xiv) The project proponent shall submit six monthly reports on the status of compliance of the stipulated environmental clearance conditions including results of monitored data (both in hard copies as well as by e-mail) to the Ministry of Environment and Forests, its Regional Office Bhubaneswar, the respective Zonal Office of Central Pollution Control Board and the State Pollution Control Board. The proponent shall upload the status of compliance of the environmental clearance conditions, including results of monitored data on their website and shall update the same periodically. It shall simultaneously be sent to the Regional Office of the Ministry of Environment and Forests, Bhubaneswar, the respective Zonal Officer of Central Pollution Control Board and the State Pollution Control Board.
- (xv) A copy of the clearance letter shall be sent by the proponent to concerned Panchayat, Zila Parisad/ Municipal Corporation, Urban Local Body and the Local NGO, if any, from whom suggestions/ representations, if any, were received while processing the proposal. The clearance letter shall also be put on the website of the Company by the proponent.
- (xvi) The State Pollution Control Board should display a copy of the clearance letter at the Regional office, District Industry Centre and the Collector's office/ Tehsildar's Office for 30 days.
- (xvii) The environmental statement for each financial year ending 31st March in Form-V as is mandated to be submitted by the project proponent to the concerned State Pollution Control Board as prescribed under the Environment (Protection) Rules, 1986, as amended subsequently, shall also be put on the website of the company along with the status of compliance of environmental clearance conditions and shall also be sent to the respective Regional Office of the Ministry of Environment and Forests, Bhubaneswar by e-mail.
- (xviii) The project authorities should advertise at least in two local newspapers of the District or State in which the project is located and widely circulated, one of Page 7 of 9

which shall be in the vernacular language of the locality concerned, within 7 days of the issue of the clearance letter informing that the project has been accorded environmental clearance and a copy of the clearance letter is available with the State Pollution Control Board and also at web site of the Ministry of Environment and Forests at http://envfor.nic.in and a copy of the same should be forwarded to the Regional Office of this Ministry located at Bhubaneswar.

- 9. The Ministry or any other competent authority may alter/modify the above conditions or stipulate any further condition in the interest of environment protection.
- 10. Failure to comply with any of the conditions mentioned above may result in withdrawal of this clearance and attract action under the provisions of the Environment (Protection) Act, 1986.
- 11. The above conditions will be enforced inter-alia, under the provisions of the Water (Prevention & Control of Pollution) Act, 1974, the Air (Prevention & Control of Pollution) Act, 1981, the Environment (Protection) Act, 1986 and the Public Liability Insurance Act, 1991 along with their amendments and rules made thereunder and also any other orders passed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India/ High Court of Jharkhand and any other Court of Law relating to the subject matter.
- 12. Any appeal against this environmental clearance shall lie with the National Green Tribunal, if preferred, within a period of 30 days as prescribed under Section 16 of the National Green Tribunal Act, 2010.
